I. Introduction

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) is a wide-ranging civil rights law that prohibits discrimination against people with disabilities in employment, transportation, public accommodation, communications, and governmental activities. It is a law that was enacted by the U. S. Congress in 1990. It was signed into law on July 26, 1990, by President George H. W. Bush. On July 23, 2010, Attorney General Eric Holder signed final regulations revising the Department’s ADA regulations, including its ADA Standards for Accessible Design. These final rules went into effect on March 15, 2011, but were not required until March 15, 2012.

There are five (5) separate Titles (or sections) of the Americans with Disabilities Act (hereafter referred to as “ADA”). The titles of the ADA are as follows:

- A. Title I – Employment
- B. Title II – Public Services and Transportation
- C. Title III – Public Accommodations
- D. Title IV – Telecommunications
- E. Title V – Miscellaneous

Pursuant to Title II of the ADA, public entities are prohibited from discriminating on the basis of a disability. All programs, services and activities offered by the public entity must be accessible to persons with disabilities. In order to accomplish this, the Department of Justice developed regulations requiring the City to conduct a self-evaluation of the accessibility of its programs and services to determine whether issues of accessibility could be addressed through changes in the way such programs and services are provided. The City is obligated to remove physical barriers to accessibility when program changes cannot ensure access to services, programs, and activities in existing facilities. Realizing that the structural changes would take time and money to provide, the Department of Justice Regulations, Federal Register 28 CFR Part 35 states that “in the event that structural changes to facilities will be undertaken to achieve program accessibility, a public entity that employs 50 or more persons shall develop, a Transition Plan setting forth the steps necessary to complete such changes.” Additionally, “if a public entity has responsibility or authority over streets, roads, or walkways, its Transition Plan shall include a schedule for providing curb ramps or other sloped areas where pedestrian walks cross curbs, giving priority to walkways serving entities covered by the Act.”

The ADA Regulations further require the Transition Plan to contain the following elements:

- A. A list of physical barriers in the public facilities that limit the accessibility of its programs, services, or activities to individuals with disabilities;
- B. A detailed description of the methods to be utilized to remove these barriers and make the facilities accessible;

- C. The schedule for taking the necessary steps to achieve compliance with Title II;
- D. The name of the official responsible for the plan's implementation;
- E. A schedule for providing curb ramps or other slopes areas where pedestrian walks cross curbs. Priorities should be given in the following order:
 - 1. State and local government offices
 - 2. Transportation
 - 3. Places of public accommodation
 - 4. Employers
 - 5. Other areas (e.g., residential areas where people needing curb cuts reside)
- F. The opportunity for the disability community and other interested parties to participate in the development of the Transition Plan.

II. ADA Program

A. Responsible Official

An Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Compliance Coordinator has been designated by the Mayor as the person responsible for the development and implementation of the City's ADA Transition Plan.

B. Public Review

The Mayor's Office has created an Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Advisory Council. This body is chaired by the City's ADA Compliance Coordinator and consists of one disabled city resident from each of the City's seven wards, and four additional individuals with disabilities that represent agencies or organizations that offer programs or services to those with disabilities. This group has developed policies and procedures which have been adopted by the ADA Advisory Council. This Policies and Procedures document is attached as Appendix 'A'.

This body is an advocate for those with disabilities. It reviews and evaluates policies, procedures, programs, services, plans and other aspects of all City functions to determine if the needs of the disabled community are being addressed.

This group holds regularly scheduled monthly meetings that are open to the public. The Advisory Council welcomes the opportunity to learn how it can better serve the disabled community. The public may give input and comment on matters related to the ADA to a

City staff person, their City Council representative, and the ADA Advisory Council. However, the City recommends that all comments be directed to the ADA Compliance Coordinator. Reports may be made verbally through the City of Jackson's 311 System or in writing by U. S. Mail, by e-mail, or electronic transmission to the 311 System.

Alternative formats of this Transition Plan can be made available upon request and is available on the City's website.

C. Self-evaluation

The City is in the process of conducting self-evaluations of each department's programs, services, and activities to ensure that they are accessible to and usable by persons with disabilities. The ADA Compliance Coordinator has worked with the Task force that was established with representatives for each Department, who were responsible for ensuring that each Department completed the self-evaluation process. Once complete, self-evaluations completed by each Department will be attached as Appendix "B".

Based upon each Department's self-evaluations, an Action Plan will subsequently be developed by each Department listing specific policy or program modifications needed, and target dates by which those Departments would make the necessary changes. Once each Action Plan is finalized, they will be attached as Appendix "C". Architectural barriers at facilities and infrastructure issues are addressed separately in the City's Barrier Removal Survey in Section III.

D. Grievance Procedure

The City of Jackson developed a disabled access complaint procedure for individuals who have an ADA issue with regard to program or facility access. This Grievance Procedure is outlined in Appendix "D". The process was designed by the ADA Advisory Council and the ADA Compliance Coordinator. The complaint form, attached hereto as Appendix "E", has been distributed to the ADA Compliance Coordinator, and is available through that office, or may be found on-line at the City of Jackson's website. In addition, complaints may be given via telephone, facsimile, or internet communication to the ADA Liaison in each Department.

III. Transition Plan

A. Barrier Removal and Compliance Strategies for Buildings and Facilities

The ADA Compliance Coordinator has the responsibility of identifying barriers and implementing the City's barrier removal program. The City's building inventory has over 150 facilities, with only slightly more than thirty of those buildings not being open to the public. City staff prioritized the publicly used buildings, which were then placed in seven categories based on public accessibility, number of people served, whether the

facility serves a large aging or disabled population, and the age of the facility. The listing of facilities covered all cultural and governmental centers and offices, all community centers, libraries, police precincts, fire stations, and recreational facilities.

The City then solicited Statements of Qualifications from Consultants through a public review process. The review panel, which included the ADA Compliance Coordinator, the City Landscape Architect, the Business Development Manager, and representatives from the Chief Administrator's Office and the Office of the City Attorney, selected a Consultant to conduct an access survey on the buildings to identify barriers to accessibility. The Consultant was also asked to recommend ADA compliant solutions, including a cost estimate for each barrier. The result of this project is referred to as the City of Jackson ADA Facilities Report. Executive Summary reports are found in Appendix "F". The City of Jackson ADA Facilities Report will be updated as further surveys are completed and solutions recommended.

Access to and usability of City facilities by individuals with disabilities is frequently compromised by one or more of the barriers listed below. This list is not exhaustive or necessarily complete, but represents typical barriers identified by the Consultant in the facilities report, which will need to be addressed during the transition process.

Site: Exterior routes of travel are interrupted by stairs, curbs, cracks or other changes in elevation, or by obstructions or protruding objects. Routes of travel from transportation stops are not accessible. Curb ramps are absent, do not connect to a serviceable sidewalk, or do not meet current requirements. Accessible routes are not clearly indicated through signage.

Parking: The numbers of accessible parking spaces are not proportionate with the total number of spaces, by current standards. Van accessible spaces are not provided. Accessible spaces do not completely conform to the current requirements for size, location, marking, and signage. Curb ramps do not meet current requirements. Parking lots are not properly signed concerning penalties for improper handicap parking usage. Drop-off areas are not accessible.

Building Entrances: Entrances are not ramped, or ramps do not meet the requirements for width, slope, cross-slope, landings, and/or handrail shape and height. Level landings are not provided or are not of sufficient width or depth. Doors require excessive effort to open, and close too quickly to allow safe passage. Doors are not of sufficient width or have knob-type handles.

Interior Signage: Accessibility information is not provided in building directories. Accessible facilities are not marked as accessible, and no information is posted at inaccessible facilities indicating the location of the nearest accessible facility. Tactile and Braille permanent room signs are not provided.

Interior Routes of Travel: Lobbies, corridors and other passages have obstructions or protruding objects such as drinking fountains, counter tops, projecting signs

and other projecting objects, which, when improperly located, may be hazardous to individuals with vision disabilities. Interior routes of travel are interrupted by level changes which are not ramped, or ramps do not meet current requirements for width, slope, cross-slope, landings, and/or handrail shape and height.

Stairs: Handrails do not meet the requirement for shape and height. Visual warnings are not provided at tread nose/edge. Risers and treads do not meet the requirements for shape, or the risers are open, presenting a potential tripping hazard.

Interior Doors: Doors are not sufficiently wide. Maneuvering clearance for individuals using wheelchairs is not provided. Doors require excessive effort to open, and close too quickly to allow safe passage. Doors are not of sufficient width or have knob-type handles.

Elevators: Timing on elevator requires adjustment. Call buttons and control buttons are too high. No audible signal is provided. No emergency phone is provided. Braille indicators are not provided; cab size is inadequate.

Sanitary Facilities: Doors do not meet current requirements. Signage does not meet current requirements. Maneuvering clearances are inadequate. Mounting heights of plumbing fixtures and accessories are too high. If an accessible compartment is provided, clearances and grab bars do not meet current requirements. Faucets are twist-type. Insulation is not provided on pipes under lavatories.

Telephones: Mounting heights are too high. Telephones project into accessible routes, and are hazards to persons with vision disabilities. Text telephones are not provided where they are required. Signage indicating the location of the nearest text telephone is not provided.

Alarms: Visual alarms are not provided in sanitary facilities and meeting rooms with fixed seating. Lecterns and podiums are not accessible to individuals in wheelchairs. Assistive listening systems are not provided.

Food Service Areas: Self-service dispensers are too high.

Compliance strategies for removing access barriers in facilities, as required by the ADA, are as follows:

1. Targeted Barrier Removal Projects

The City is implementing a barrier removal program in City-owned facilities where programmatic changes cannot be made to effectively meet the requirements of the ADA. The program is based on the ADA Facilities Report Survey conducted by the Consultant and constitutes the City's Transition Plan of access upgrades with targeted dates for completion. The Plan was developed with the assistance of the ADA

Compliance Coordinator, the ADA Advisory Council, and the ADA Transition Plan Team. The program will be reviewed annually by the Committee to determine if it continues to meet the most important needs of the disabled community and to ensure sufficient budget planning.

The top priority of the Plan is to make the city-wide facilities accessible first. City-wide facilities are those which serve residents of the entire City rather than individual communities, and which will be utilized by tourists and visitors to the City of Jackson as well. Examples of these types of facilities are all public facilities in the Arts District (Thalia Mara Hall, the Mississippi Museum of Art, the Arts Center of Mississippi), the Russell C. Davis Planetarium, City Hall and other office buildings where the City conducts business, and all buildings and facilities that offer programs and services to the public. High priority will also be placed on transit facilities, and areas with a large concentration of medical offices and facilities that offer programs and services to the disabled community. Other areas that will receive immediate consideration are public housing and retail areas with a high disabled clientele.

It is anticipated that almost all of this work will be performed by General Contractors skilled in ADA regulations and ADA compliance work. City crews will be trained to perform ADA compliant work as well.

2. Minor Maintenance and Repair Work

When appropriate, the City is bringing facilities into compliance by replacing outdated or broken fixtures with compliant ones; e.g., a broken twist-type door knob would be replaced with a lever-type door handle.

3. Retrofit or Remodel Projects by City Departments

Whenever a remodel project is scheduled for City facilities, ADA upgrades are included in the project, regardless of the costs.

4. Leased Facilities

When inter-local, lease or any other agreements are scheduled for renewal; facilities are required to come into compliance with the ADA. The City will require that mandated changes be negotiated with the lease.

B. Barrier Removal and Compliance Strategies For Public Rights-Of-Way

The ADA Compliance Coordinator and the Engineering Division of the Department of Public Works are responsible for the City's Transition Plan in the City Rights-Of-Way. Most of the problems in the Rights-Of-Way concern physical barriers which cannot be addressed through other options such as policy changes, alternative methodologies, or adaptive aids. Therefore, the public Rights-Of-Way can only be made accessible through a realistic and fundable strategy for curb ramp installation and sidewalk modifications.

The City of Jackson Department of Public Works, through contract construction, installs curb ramps and reconstructs or modifies existing sidewalks to provide accessibility on public Rights-Of-Way to users of the facilities in compliance with the Americans with

Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990 and the Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines (ADAAG) Title II and Title III 2010 updated standards. The City looks to the draft Public Rights-of-Way Accessibility Guidelines (PROWAG) to supplement ADAAG.

The Department of Public Works evaluates upcoming street construction projects to determine if a street that presently has no sidewalks is a suitable candidate for brand new sidewalks. Right-of-way acquisition, construction and easement cost compared to the overall project cost, and other environmental factors are considered to determine if new sidewalks are justified.

Public Works has adopted guidelines for prioritizing curb ramp and sidewalk installations as stand-alone projects. The guidelines establish a priority system for construction or reconstruction of curb ramps and sidewalks within the City of Jackson. These guidelines will be used by City staff to prioritize annual capital improvement projects for construction or reconstruction of curb ramps and sidewalks. These criteria will also be used during the implementation phase of the ADA Curb Ramp & Sidewalk Transition Plan as part of the City's overall ADA Transition Plan efforts.

Sidewalk Compliance Prioritization Criteria

There are several evaluation factors and criteria for prioritizing curb ramp and sidewalk barrier removal and the installation of new curb ramps in the public right-of-way, including but not limited to the criteria included below:

1. Citizen Complaints and Requests (ADA Title II – Program Accessibility)
2. Sidewalk overall priorities
3. Pedestrian usage by type of facilities
4. Mobility evaluation
5. Geographical factors

The analysis to establish yearly priorities for the implementation of this policy include, but are not limited to, the following criteria in descending order from high to low priority:

1. Citizen Complaints
When a complaint or request for the repair of non-compliant sidewalks and curb ramps is received, the decision on whether the requested improvements is to be built will be based on the priority system described below.
2. Sidewalk Overall Priorities
 - a. Specific requests of citizens with disabilities.
 - b. Reconstruct curb ramps and sidewalks at locations where existing curb ramps and sidewalks have hazardous and unsafe conditions that may cause a trip or fall.
 - c. Install new curb ramps at locations where there is no curb ramp to provide accessibility to existing sidewalks.

- d. Construct or reconstruct sidewalks and curb ramps to connect short gaps in an overall section of sidewalk.
 - e. Install an additional curb ramp when there is one existing curb ramp and the existing conditions allow for construction of an additional curb ramp at the same return and provided that traffic controls allow for safe path of travel.
 - f. Construct or reconstruct a curb ramp at locations where difficult physical conditions exists such as major utility conflicts, physical barriers or other constraints, which would create a “hardship” situation on the public entity.
 - g. Reconstruct substandard curb ramps that do not meet current Federal and State Disability Codes, but do not have hazardous conditions.
 - h. Provide detectable warnings and contrasting color with adjacent surfaces at existing, otherwise compliant, curb ramps, applying also other priority criteria established like usage by type of facilities, mobility evaluation, as well as geographical factors.
3. Pedestrian Usage By Type Of Facilities
Correct non-compliant sidewalks and curb ramps at the intersections around the block containing the following facilities (listed in priority order):
- a. Proximity to facilities highly used by persons with disabilities.
(Hospitals, Health Care Facilities, Community Centers)
 - b. Proximity to key facilities utilized by all pedestrians both disabled and able-bodied (Government Service Buildings, Schools)
 - c. Mass transit access points (Public transit routes, stops, and terminals)
 - d. Density (number of businesses, recreation, social services, etc.):
 - Commercial Areas
 - Recreational Areas
 - Residential Areas
 - Industrial Areas
4. Mobility Evaluation
- a. Volume of traffic
 - b. Presence of pedestrian islands
 - c. Proximity to other accessible improvements
5. Overall Priorities by Geographical Factors
- a. Main arterial streets
 - b. Collector streets
 - c. Neighborhood streets

C. Transit Stops

The City of Jackson, Department of Planning and Development, Transit Services Division has jurisdiction over the City’s public bus transit system called JATRAN; including bus routes and transit stop location and design. The vast majority of stops are in City right-of-way or MDOT right-of-way with a small number on private

property with permission from the property owner. The City strives to ensure that public transit stops are accessible. Numerous factors that are considered in the design of new bus stop locations or the rehabilitation or relocation of existing bus stops include but are not limited to:

- Shelter conditions
- Slope gradation
- Paths of travel to and from the bus stop
- Potential destinations near the bus stop
- Maneuverability
- Stair access
- Bus stop surfacing
- Available right-of-way for bus stop improvements

The City Transit Services Division is currently evaluating bus stop routes and locations to determine if current bus routes, bus stop locations and bus stop spacing meet current ridership demands and design requirements. The City Transit Services Division has identified a number of stops that are scheduled to be upgraded. Those stops are identified and prioritized in Appendix “I”. Some of the stops in Appendix “I” are general locations with the final location or relocation to be determined on the evaluation and design criteria. Based on the final outcome of the bus stop evaluation, additional bus stops will be added to the ADA Improvement Plan.

D. Other Agencies

The Mississippi Transportation Commission, through the Mississippi Department of Transportation controls the right-of-way on the state highway system. In Jackson, these highways include:

- Interstates 20, 55, and 220
- US Highways 49 and 80
- Mississippi Highways 18 and 25
- Frontage Roads along I-20, I-55, and US 80
- Certain sections of street within or near the interstate interchanges.

State law governs the responsibility of both the Mississippi Transportation Commission and municipalities with regard to state highway right-of-way.

E. Plan Yearly Updates and Additional Prioritization Criteria

The Department of Public Works will select a designated employee to receive, evaluate and respond to requests for curb ramps. Public Works will solicit and receive written or verbal request from persons with disabilities for installation of curb ramps. Request may be made using a variety of communication media, including, but not limited to, e-mails, letters and phone calls.

At least annually, the Director of Public Works and the City Engineering Manager will review all public requests for sidewalk accessibility improvements and develop an annual ADA Compliance Plan. The annual plan will be prioritized based Analysis of various

factors that influence the determination of the yearly City of Jackson priorities for the implementation of curb ramp barrier removal and installation of new curb ramps:

1. Sidewalk repairs and curb ramps required to complete an accessible path of travel in a specific area or pedestrian corridor.
It is important to complete the accessible path of travel in areas of the City where there is a high level of existing curb ramps, general path of travel accessibility and there are only a few curb ramps missing to complete the full accessibility of the entire geographical area. The disabled community will greatly benefit from having areas of the City where the installation of curb ramps has been completed.
2. Citizen complaints regarding specific sections of existing sidewalk
It is important to track the citizen complaints or requests regarding specific curb ramps and to have a system to evaluate them in order to give them a priority for implementation that should be coordinated every year at the time to establish the list of projects and barriers to be removed in each fiscal year depending on the existing budget.
3. Coordination with street resurfacing and reconstruction projects.
As part of the yearly ADA Compliance Plan, requests for sidewalk accessibility improvements on streets scheduled for street resurfacing or street reconstruction should be included in those street projects.
4. Overall City Priorities by Ward
Depending on project prioritization and demand, the City will seek to include in each fiscal year some barrier removal projects in each of the City's seven wards, to ensure that ADA improvements are equitably spread throughout the City of Jackson where needs among the wards based on the Prioritization Criteria are equal.

F. Public Participation – Public Right-Of-Way (PROW) Improvement Programs

1. Draft Plan Review
The draft plan will be made available in hard copies at the Department of Public Works Engineering Division, the Department of Human and Cultural Services, and City Hall for review. The draft plan will also be posted on the City website in both Word and PDF format. The public will be able to submit written comments to the Department of Public Works for review and potential inclusion in the transition plan.
2. Citizen Request Program:
Citizens are able to submit a request for sidewalk or facility compliance improvements for review and inclusion in the annual ADA Compliance Plan. The requests will be reviewed and prioritized for consideration in the plan.

Appendix A

City of Jackson Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Advisory Council Policies and Procedures

Article I – Name

The name of this body shall be the City of Jackson Americans with Disabilities Act Advisory Council, hereinafter referred to as the “ADA Advisory Council”.

Article II – Purpose

The ADA Compliance Coordinator of the City of Jackson will serve as a liaison role to the Mayor’s Office, in an effort to ensure the City’s compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. The ADA Advisory Council will perform the following duties:

1. Review City’s policies, priorities, and projects. Upon review, provide advice to the Mayor’s Office regarding disability issues arising there from.
2. Assist the City to ensure that buildings, services, programs, meetings, public transportation and employment opportunities are accessible to persons with disabilities.
3. Serve as liaison between the City and the public for persons with disabilities, when a disability or accessibility complaint is made regarding City facilities. The ADA Advisory Council will work with appropriate City officials and departments to resolve situations and bring about corrective change within the City.
4. Advise and educated the Mayor’s Office on disability related issues.
5. Advocate for accessibility for persons with disabilities with regard to all City of Jackson services and facilities.

Article III – Rights and Responsibilities

The City of Jackson shall provide staff support to include, but not limited to: secretarial, clerical, and financial support for the ASA Coordinator for training, conferences and so forth for the work of the ADA Advisory Council.

Article IV – Membership

- A. The ADA Advisory Council shall consist of members who have been appointed by the Mayor. These members shall consist of the following, each having the same duties and responsibilities:

1. Seven (7) persons who shall represent each of the City Council wards of Jackson, Mississippi. These appointed persons shall be City residents with disabilities or persons that represent City of Jackson agencies serving persons with disabilities.
 2. Four additional individuals with disabilities representing agencies or organizations working with persons with disabilities, appointed at-large by the Mayor. These organizations shall be recommended by the ADA Coordinator.
 3. The City of Jackson ADA Compliance Coordinator or his/her designee.
- B. Each appointed ADA Advisory council member shall serve a two (2) year term.
- C. Each member has one full vote on any decision put to a vote. Each member is to participate in some facet of the ADA Advisory Council's work. Members are expected to participate in at least 60% of the meetings during the course of the Council's operating year. Any member who is unable to attend a given meeting shall give advance notice of his/her inability to the Chairperson/ADA Compliance Coordinator or the support staff assigned to the council.
- D. All members can be removed at any time for any reason by a four-fifths vote of the Council. The person appointed to fill a vacancy so created shall serve the remaining term for which the person so removed was appointed. Each council member shall, however, continue to serve until a successor has been duly appointed and qualified.

Article V – Officers

- A. The ADA Advisory Council shall elect a chairperson and vice-chairperson from among council members at the first meeting, and every two years thereafter at the first meeting of the calendar year. Elections shall be by the majority vote cast by the ADA Advisory Council members in attendance. Officers must be present to be nominated and elected.
- B. The elected Chairperson shall call and preside over all ADA Advisory Council meetings, be the spokesperson for the council along with the ADA Compliance Coordinator, and be responsible for all correspondence of the council in its public relations and to the Mayor. The Vice-Chairperson shall assume all duties and have the authority of the elected Chairperson, in the absence of the elected Chairperson.
- C. By a four-fifths vote of a quorum of the council members present, an officer may be recommended for removal as an officer to the council. The officer will be extended the opportunity to hear ADA Advisory Council member concerns, and a 30-day period to correct any deficiencies before the vote is taken.

Article VI – Committees

The ADA Advisory council may form standing, ad hoc, and/or joint committees.

Article VII – Meetings

- A. The ADA Advisory Council shall meet at a consistent hour, day, and place as determined by the council. Each regular meeting of the council shall be noticed and publicized and shall include the time, date, and place of the meeting and a copy of the meeting agenda. Staff provided by the City of Jackson shall be responsible for providing meeting notifications. Not less than 14-day advance notice in writing of regular meetings shall be given to all members. Not less than 7 days advance notice in writing of special meetings shall be given to all members.
- B. The Chairperson or a majority of the ADA Advisory Council members may call special meetings. Business at special meetings shall be limited to the subjects stated in the call for them.
- C. All meetings of the ADA Advisory Council and meetings of all committees, subcommittees, and joint committees shall be open to the public and conducted in accordance with Robert’s Rules of Order (revised edition). Meetings will be accessible to all, with accommodations for accessibility issues made upon request.
- D. A quorum is necessary for business to be conducted by the ADA Advisory Council. A quorum shall be defined as one person more than one-half of the total appointed members.

Article VII - Adoption and Amendment

- A. The Policies and Procedures shall become effective immediately upon approval by the Mayor.
- B. These Policies and Procedures may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of The ADA Advisory Council and subsequent approval by the Mayor. Prior to consideration of the Policy and Procedure amendments, the ADA Advisory Council shall be notified, thirty days in advance, of the proposed language changes, and the time, day, and place of the ADA Advisory Council meeting at which such amendments shall be considered.

Appendix D

City of Jackson Grievance Procedure under the Americans with Disabilities Act

This Grievance Procedure is established to meet the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 ("ADA"). It may be used by anyone who wishes to file a complaint alleging discrimination on the basis of disability in the provision of services, activities, programs, or benefits by the City of Jackson, Mississippi. The City of Jackson's Personnel Policy governs employment-related complaints of disability discrimination.

The complaint should be in writing, and contain information about the alleged discrimination, such as: name, address, phone number of complainant and location, date, and description of the problem. Alternative means of filing complaints, such as personal interviews or a tape recording of the complaint, will be made available for persons with disabilities upon request.

The complaint should be submitted by the grievant and/or his/her designee as soon as possible but no later than 60 calendar days after the alleged violation to:

Within fifteen (15) calendar days after receipt of the complaint, the ADA Compliance Coordinator, or their designee will meet with the complainant to discuss the complaint and the possible resolutions. Within fifteen (15) calendar days of the meeting the ADA Compliance Coordinator, or their designee will respond in writing, and where appropriate, in a format accessible to the complainant, such as large print, Braille, or audio tape. The response will explain the position of the City of Jackson, and offer options for substantive resolution of the complaint.

If the response by the ADA Compliance Coordinator, or their designee, does not satisfactorily resolve the issue, the complainant and/or his or her designee may appeal the decision within 15 calendar days after receipt of the response to the Mayor's Chief Administrative Office or their designee.

Within 15 calendar days after receipt of the appeal, the Mayor's Chief Administrative Office, or their designee, will meet with the complainant to discuss the complaint and possible resolutions. Within 15 calendar days after the meeting, the Mayor's Chief Administrative Office, or their designee, will respond in writing, and, where appropriate, in a format accessible to the complainant, with a final resolution of the complaint.

All written complaints received by the ADA Compliance Coordinator or their designee, appeals to the Mayor's Chief Administrative Office or their designee, and responses from these two offices will be retained by the City of Jackson for at least three years.

City of Jackson Facilities Report Executive Summary

Introduction

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) is a civil rights law that mandates equal opportunity for individuals with disabilities. The ADA prohibits discrimination in access to jobs, public accommodations, government services, public transportation and telecommunications. The City of Jackson, Mississippi (the City), has undertaken a comprehensive evaluation of its facilities to determine the extent to which individuals with disabilities may be restricted in their access to Municipal services and activities.

This report describes the process developed to complete the physical evaluation of 23 City facilities of the 157 owned and/ or operated, as well as to present recommendations for the modification of these facilities.

- Nine fire stations reviewed for public accessibility as polling places.
- Fire station issues include
 - Restrooms
 - Parking
 - Minor grade changes on paths of travel
- Remaining 14 facilities have from 20 to over 40 issues each
- Minor items include but are not limited to
 - Changing out signage
 - Changing out door hardware
 - Parking re-stripping
- Major items include but are not limited to
 - Demolition of existing ramps and stairways
 - Construction of ramps, stairways and handrails
 - Re-surfacing of portions of parking lots
 - Construction of new elevator shafts and providing new cab

It is the intent of the City to address those items listed in the recommendations within a time frame of one to seven years, depending on immediate necessity, degree of complexity and overall funding availability.

The City reserves the right to adjust barrier removal priorities in order to allow flexibility in accommodating community requests, petitions for reasonable modifications from persons with disabilities, and changes in the City's programs.

This document will guide the planning and implementation of facility modifications over the next several years. The ADA Transition Plan Update is significant in that it affirms the City's commitment to the development and maintenance of facilities that include all of its citizens, employees, and members of the public.

Federal Accessibility Requirements

The City of Jackson, Mississippi is obligated to observe all requirements of Title I in its employment practices; Title II in its policies, programs and services; any parts of Titles IV and V that apply to the City and its programs, services or facilities; and all requirements specified in the ADA Accessibility Guidelines (ADAAG).

State of Mississippi Accessibility Requirements

The accessibility statutes fall under Title 43, Chapter 6 of the Mississippi Code. Portions of Chapter 6 pertain to the City:

- **SEC. 43-6-3. Right to use public facilities** - Blind persons, visually handicapped persons, deaf persons and other physically disabled persons shall have the same right as the able-bodied to the full and free use of the streets, highways, sidewalks, walkways, public buildings, public facilities, and other public places.
- **SEC. 43-6-101. Applicability of standards** - The state building commission, the boards of supervisors of each county, the governing authorities of each municipality and the governing authorities of all political subdivisions of this state, pursuant to an order of the state board of health, shall cause to be constructed such entrance ramps to facilitate ingress and egress in each public building under the supervision of the said governing bodies, including buildings which presently exist, which are presently under construction, or which may be constructed after July 1, 1972. The standards and specifications set forth in sections [43-6-103](#) to [43-6-121](#) shall apply to all buildings of assembly, educational institutions, office buildings, and other public buildings which are constructed in whole or in part by the use of state, county or municipal funds, or the funds of any instrumentality of the state, except where such compliance is impractical in the opinion of the state board of health. All such buildings and facilities in this state on which design contracts are awarded after July 1, 1972, shall conform to each of the standards and specifications prescribed therein.
- **SEC. 43-6-121. Removal of hazards** - Every effort shall be exercised to obviate all hazards to individuals with physical disabilities.

The City of Jackson's Approach

In July of 2009, the City of Jackson began an effort to draft and adopt an ADA Transition Plan. The Transition Plan, in accordance with Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act included a survey of facilities owned and/ or operated by the City. These facilities included parking lots, buildings, recreational areas, and paths of travel where programs, services or support activities are provided for the public.

The ADA Transition Plan process was led by a team from JBHM Architects and SOL Engineers. These team members consisted of architects, engineers, interior designers, and landscape architects.

ADA Transition Plan: Process and Summary Findings

The process developed for the preparation of the ADA Transition Plan included a survey of City facilities prioritized by City staff. This prioritization was based upon the following items:

- Is the facility open to the public
- The number of people the facility serves
- Does the facility serve an aging population
- Has the facility been renovated since 1993

The team conducted a detailed survey of architectural barriers in its buildings, parking lots and paths of travel during the Fall of 2009 and Spring of 2010. Those areas open to the public were surveyed. The surveys provided the Team an overview of the architectural elements that present barriers to people with disabilities from using the City's facilities and participating in its programs. These barriers were then recorded into the report.

Facility Surveys

The survey process was accomplished using teams of surveyors equipped with measuring devices, facility diagrams, cameras, and survey forms. The surveys identified physical barriers in City buildings, parking, and paths of travel based on ADAAG and Title 43 standards. Sketches of each site and building or floor plan were annotated during the survey process and are included in the facility reports. The diagrams provide a visual reference for evaluating the physical and programmatic barriers posed by each architectural barrier. The facility surveys are available for inspection and review upon request. The format preferred should be set forth in the request, and the City will take all steps to substantially comply with said request.

Facility Reports

A facility report was produced for each building, parking lot and facility, and path of travel route. The reports detail each item found to be in noncompliance with ADAAG and Title 43 standards. The facility report for each site includes:

- **Recommendation Summary List:** A summary of conceptual solutions (recommendations) in text format for interior and exterior elements that should be changed to bring the individual facility into compliance in reference to the public use or the public program at that facility.
- **Detail Report for Interior and Exterior:** Listing of existing conditions, detailed assessments, and recommendations in text format.

- **Photos:** Photos used to help identify existing conditions.
- **Survey forms:** Actual survey forms used in the field to make assessments based on Title II guidelines.

The facility reports are available for inspection and review upon request. The format preferred should be set forth in the request, and the City will take all steps to substantially comply with said request.

On-Going Accessibility Improvements

The City of Jackson facilities staff is responsible for developing both new and renovation projects in compliance with all applicable codes and regulations including the Americans with Disabilities Act.



City of Jackson Barrier Removal and Compliance Strategy for Public Rights-Of-Way Executive Summary

Introduction

The City's approach to a comprehensive evaluation of its facilities and determine the extent to which individuals with disabilities may be restricted in their access to Municipal services and activities, the City has included evaluations of sidewalks, curb ramps, and pedestrian signals within the City's rights-of-way.

This appendix describes the process developed to complete the prioritization of City curb ramps, sidewalks, and pedestrian signals designed and/or operated.

The prioritization of these facilities was based on several factors. They include the following:

- Citizen Complaints Requests
- Sidewalk overall priorities
- Pedestrian usage by type of facilities
- Mobility evaluation
- Geographical factors

In this portion of the transition plan at this time, only the signalized intersections within the City were rated and prioritized. Each of the above listed factors had their own internal ranking system for prioritization. As an example, the pedestrian usage by type of facility was directly tied back to the ranking of the City of Jackson Facilities. This ranking was based off amount of use, age of facility, type of programs at facility, date of last renovation. Geographic factors fell in line with the City's Curb Ramp and Sidewalk Prioritization. This individual factor looked at hospital and medical facility locations, community center locations, public school locations, and locations cited specifically by the City's ADA Advisory Committee.

It is the intent of the City to address those items listed in the recommendations within a time frame of one to seven years, depending on immediate necessity, degree of complexity and overall funding availability.

The City reserves the right to adjust barrier removal priorities in order to allow flexibility in accommodating community requests for reasonable modifications from persons with disabilities, and changes in the City's programs.

This document will guide the planning and implementation of facility modifications over the next several years. The ADA Transition Plan Update is significant in that it affirms the City's commitment to the development and maintenance of facilities that include all citizens, employees, and members of the public.

General Accessibility Requirements

The City of Jackson, Mississippi is obligated to observe all requirements of Title I in its employment practices; Title II in its policies, programs and services; any parts of Titles IV and V that apply to the City and its programs, services or facilities; and all requirements specified in the ADA Accessibility Guidelines (ADAAG).

State of Mississippi Accessibility Requirements

The accessibility statutes fall under Title 43, Chapter 6 of the Mississippi Code. Portions of Chapter 6 pertain to the City:

- **SEC. 43-6-3. Right to use public facilities** - Blind persons, visually handicapped persons, deaf persons and other physically disabled persons shall have the same right as the able-bodied to the full and free use of the streets, highways, sidewalks, walkways, public buildings, public facilities, and other public places.
- **SEC. 43-6-101. Applicability of standards** - The state building commission, the boards of supervisors of each county,

Going Accessibility Improvements

City of Jackson facilities staff is responsible for developing both new and renovation projects in compliance with all applicable codes and regulations including the Americans with Disabilities Act.



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
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


